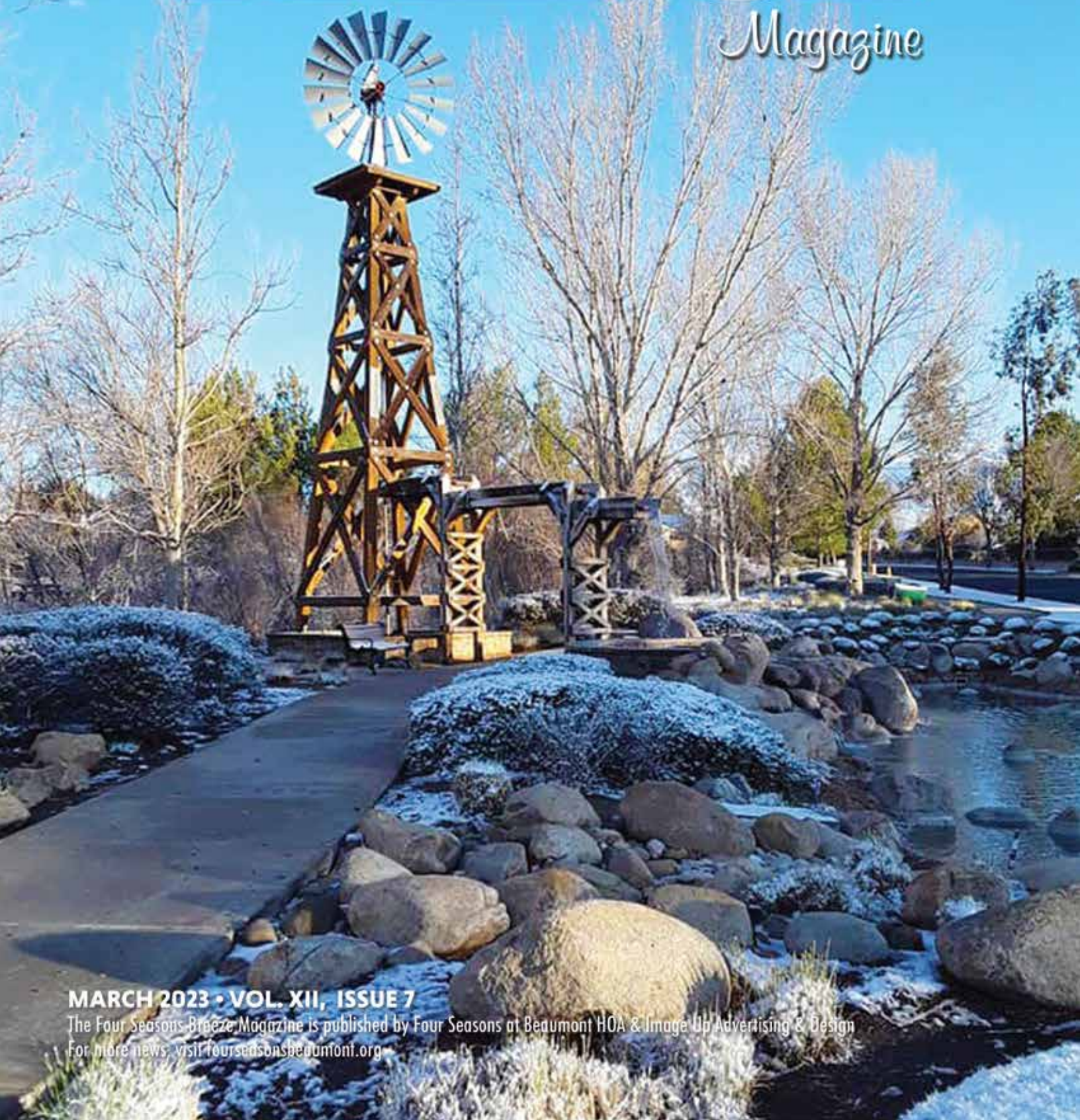

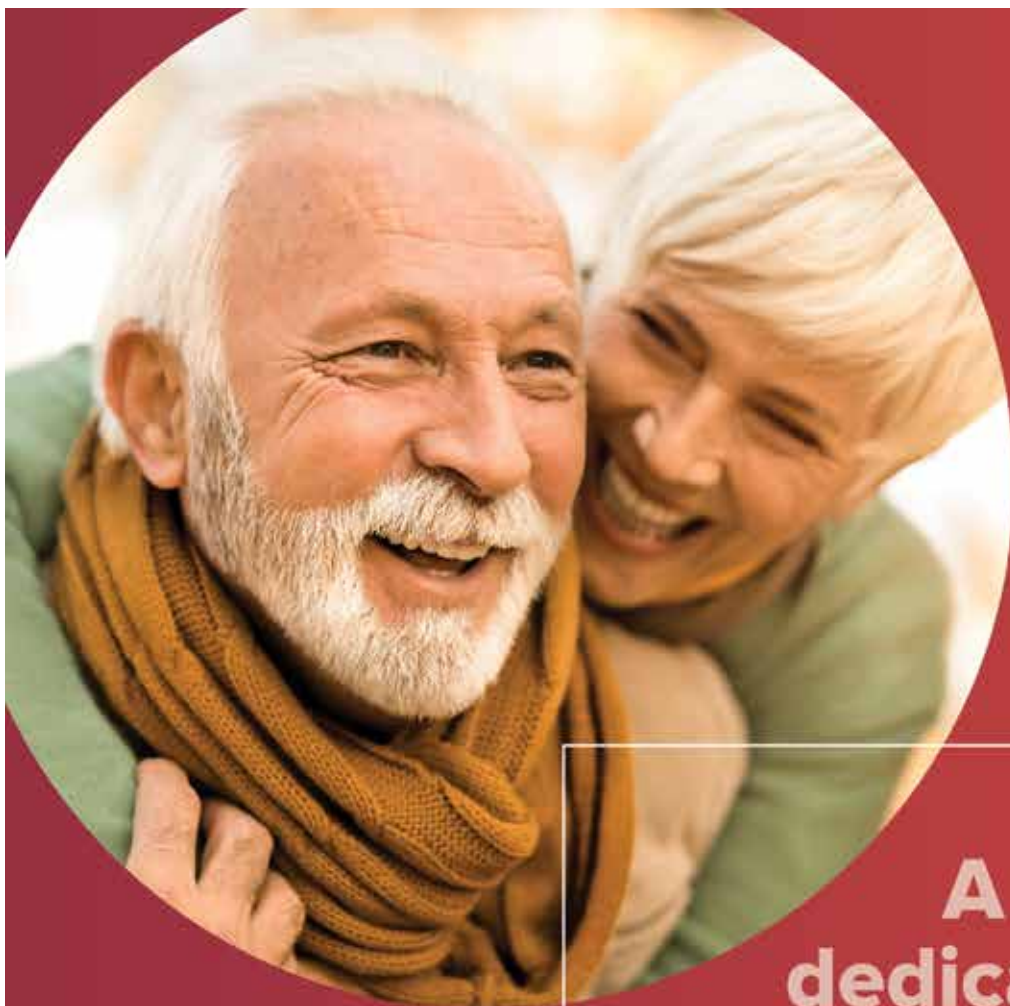

MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD

Currently many of our residents have received abnormally high natural gas bills from the Southern California Gas Company. I received a number of calls from our residents inquiring if this was occurring throughout our community, or if there might be something wrong with their meters.

I spoke to many of our residents who told me that their bills tripled from the month before. My bill tripled as well, and I called to ask them what was going on to cause this spike in the billing. A representative told me that the rates from their suppliers went up approximately 162 percent in December of 2022 from the previous December, and they were passing these costs onto their rate payers. I was also told that the rate they are paying their suppliers is expected to go down in January and February, so our rates will stabilize by March or sometime in April.

In the meantime, I have set my thermostat to 68 degrees in the daytime and turned the heat off at night. I was told by the representative not to use the fireplace unless I had to because it just burns the gas constantly and does not cycle like our heaters because of the thermostat.

Please stay healthy and contact the gas company if you do have medical issues that may qualify you for an assistance program, *Ways to Save* tool, and their Level Pay Plan at socalgas.com/ManageHigherBills.

As of this writing, the Solar PPA contract vote is still in progress. Many of our residents have submitted their ballots to be counted by the Inspector of Elections. No matter how you vote, thank you for taking the time to review the information in preparation for voting and the submission of our ballots.

Transportation update from the city of Beaumont on the Pennsylvania Grade Separation to lower Pennsylvania Avenue under the existing UPRR mainline tracks is under review. The city council authorized \$2.25 million in funding as part of the current five-year plan to complete the Environmental Documentation and Final Engineering phase after a three year hiatus.

Completion of environmental and engineering is anticipated in the

first quarter of 2024. Preliminary cost estimates for the construction is approximately \$40 million and is, at this time, unfunded.

The construction duration is anticipated to be 24-30 months after funding is in place. As you can see, this project will not be in our immediate future.

The heating of our outdoor pools will begin on April 15. The Board of Directors voted on approving that date at an open Board meeting late in 2022.

The construction defect lawsuit is still in progress and is moving forward. Inspections of our roadways, sidewalks, facility buildings, and placement of trees have been reviewed by the HOA and KHOV lawyers. Currently, dates for depositions have been scheduled prior to the setting of trial readiness dates, etc. We will keep our residents updated as we progress into the hearing phase of the court case.

The Board of Directors meet on the second Thursday of each month in an open session at 1 pm in The Lodge Ballroom. We also have an informal meeting at the RCN Building on the third Wednesday of each month where residents can discuss topics and ask questions of the Board members in attendance. These informal sessions allow the Board members to respond and participate in a question and answer period the more formal sessions do not permit.

MARCH MAINTENANCE TIPS

Clean the garbage disposal. Try pouring one cup of vinegar into an ice tray, filling with water, and letting it freeze. Run the disposal to grind the cubes and clean away grease and neutralize odor.

Replace and/or clean furnace filters.

Test air conditioning systems — summer is just around the corner!

Test smoke detector batteries and replace if necessary. (A good rule of thumb is to test every time Daylight Saving begins and ends.)

BANNING WAREHOUSE UPDATE

The court case involving the city of Banning, Creation Equity, and the Pass Action Group of Sun Lakes is ongoing. Randy Robbins of the Pass Action Group Steering Committee has advised me that as of this writing, Judge Reimer should have received the response briefs from the city of Banning and Creation Equity.

The next step will be the Pass Action Group's response to the City of Banning and Creation Equity's brief by March 9. Judge Reimer will consider the information contained in the briefs by all parties and then set a date for a hearing. It is believed the hearing could be scheduled in April or May, but as of this time no date has been scheduled.

The Pass Action Group held a Town Hall Meeting on Feb. 7 at Sun Lakes. This meeting was well attended by Sun Lakes and Four Seasons

residents and community members of Banning and Beaumont. The attendees were briefed on the progress of the case, as well as the need for continued support from the community.

Additional fundraising events are being planned by PAG at this time. Watch for information on upcoming fundraising events on our Daily Report, the website, and, if time permits, our *Breeze* magazine.

DID YOU KNOW?

DID YOU KNOW that seniors in California are often entitled to utility assistance? During this time of inflated costs, it's important to explore all money-saving measures available. Nonprofit organizations like The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) want you to know that there are many state and federal programs designed to help you manage your utility bills. These programs include California LifeLine, Deaf and Disabled Telecommunications Program (DDTP), California Alternate Rates for Energy (CARE), Energy Savings Assistance Program, Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), Family Electric Rate Assistance (FERA), Medical Baseline, Water Company Assistance.

If you or someone in your household requires the regular use of electrically-powered medical equipment or other qualifying medical devices, you may be eligible for Edison's Medical Baseline Allowance program. This program provides an additional 16.5 kilowatt-hours (kWh) of electricity per day. Provided at the lowest baseline rate, this helps offset the cost of operating the medical equipment.

RETRACING ANCIENT FOOTSTEPS

Popular among adventurous hikers are destination tours that challenge the bodies and reap the rewards of being one with nature. Read on and see if this could be for you.

Back in 2018, I joined a hiking club out of Temecula and a few months into it, the club offered a trip to Peru to hike the Inca Trail to Machu Picchu which I knew very little of but decided to give it a try. I called my life-long buddy in Upstate New York to see if he might like to join me and without hesitation, he was up for the challenge. At the time, I was living in the mountains near Idyllwild and was hiking quite a bit and thought I should be able to make this type of hike along with four other hikers from Temecula.

The hike itself was four days covering 26 miles with different terrains on a stone path that dated back to the 1450s when it was built by the Incan emperor at the time. We spent the first few days in the town of Cusco getting ourselves acclimated to the elevation of a little over 11,000 feet. As a side note for those of Irish descent (or not), if you ever visit Cusco, make sure to visit “Paddy’s” Irish Pub, which claims to be the “highest Irish pub in the world,” and of course we had to authenticate.

On the first day of the hike, our group of 15 were driven by vans to the 82 km check point of the Inca Trail in Piscacucho village. A limited number of trekking permits were allowed per day. Our team of porters, who were around five feet tall and weighed 100 pounds, carried all our gear along with our food (45-55 lbs.). They made it look easy. Those porters were truly incredible ... they prepared unbelievable meals for us and had

our tents set up when we finally arrived at our final destination at the end of each day. We had thin pads (which helped a little) under our sleeping bags inside two-man tents. They had two tents to provide ‘portapotties.’ Yes, this was camping in style, sans showers or baths.

The difficulty of this hike was the many peaks and valleys (elevation gain of around 4,200 ft.) that kept us constantly climbing up, then back down, then up and back down and so forth. The hiking poles that were issued at the beginning really helped in going up and down on all the different terrains throughout the hike.

The Inca Trail to Machu Picchu is so much more than just a hike. Our guide who was born and raised in the area, stopped at so many fascinating sites along the way, explaining the many Inca ruins, their religious beliefs, archaeological sites showing how the people lived, how they would grow their crops at different elevations for different foods, and so much more. Another amazing wonder was how they were able to move and place the huge stones that weighed thousands of pounds and have them fit so perfectly together that you could not even put a piece of paper between them. Our guide told us that for any medical condition they might have, the plants in the jungle cured it — it was all right there!

Day two was the toughest hike of the trip, but so rewarding! We hiked 10 miles and reached the highest point of the journey at “Dead Woman’s Pass” at an elevation of 13,828 feet. It got its name because when seen from the valley below, it resembles a woman lying down. This was certainly one of the highlights of the trip, leaving a feeling

of real accomplishment after the physically-strenuous trek to reach The Summit. We took a well-deserved break here and celebrated the moment. We continued on, stopping at more Inca ruins and two beautiful waterfalls before finally arriving at our campsite by early evening. Later that night after dinner, we did some stargazing and our guide pointed out the Inca constellations that can only be seen in the southern hemisphere. It was incredible!

Day three was a little easier, we hiked along the Urubamba River and saw the beautiful snow-capped mountains of the Sacred Valley, and caught a glimpse of the mountains of Machu Picchu, the next day’s hike.

Day four, we departed early at 3:30 am with headlamps to our final destination, Machu Picchu or the Lost City of the Incas. We arrived around 8 am at this breathtaking city beneath the clouds and spent the next few hours touring Machu Picchu with our guide. Machu Picchu was built by the Incas around 1450 and was occupied until approximately 1532. It was believed to have been a summer

retreat for the Inca leaders until it was abandoned from what most say was due to the Spanish invasion in the 16th century. Although the Spanish never found Machu Picchu, it remained basically deserted until the early 1900s, when an American explorer by the name of Hiram Bingham discovered the completely overgrown Lost City of the Incas. We saw the caves, the carvings in the Citadel, and the strange altars that were used. This lost civilization had engineering marvels of building their agricultural terraces for growing crops.

After the educational tour, half of us trekked up Huayna Picchu (the iconic mountain that sits behind the archaeological site) and I was exhilarated by the culmination of physical exertions and the experience of the spectacular beauty below me. There are no words

to describe the sights of Machu Picchu. You will need to actually go there and see it for yourself.

This final day of hiking ended when we all boarded the bus that brought us down the mountain to the town of Aguas Calientes to have a farewell lunch with our guide and porters. We laughed and reflected on one of the most exciting and educational hikes we've ever been on. It was truly one of those once-in-a-lifetime vacations, along with the accomplishment of hiking the famous Inca Trail to Machu Picchu. We used Alpaca Tours, but there are many available touring companies that can make this your next destination. If you ever get the chance and want to experience one hell of a hike, go for it!

'Tis time for Saint Paddy's Day! March 17 is when nearly everyone celebrates the wearing of the green. This month we have two recipes, one for drinking and one for eating. Have yourself a great St. Patrick's Day.

Buena Vista Irish Coffee

I had my first Irish coffee at the Buena Vista Café in San Francisco. The only difference between their Irish coffee and the original version is substituting sugar cubes for brown sugar. Either version is heavenly. The Buena Vista sells over 2,000 Irish coffees every day. The link below will take you to a video showing a bartender at Buena Vista making Irish coffee: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=QOSC5JunFpc>. Makes one serving in less than 10 minutes. Feel free to double, triple, or quadruple the recipe.



INGREDIENTS

- Two sugar cubes, or 1 Tablespoon sugar-light brown or granulated
- 1 ½ ounces Irish whiskey, about 3 Tablespoons
- 4 to 6 ounces fresh brewed hot coffee
- 1 to 2 ounces heavy cream, slightly whipped

DIRECTIONS

Assemble all ingredients. Preheat a 6 to 8 ounce heatproof glass by filling it with hot water. When the glass is warm, discard the water. Add the sugar to the glass, then add coffee until the glass is 3/4 full. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Add the whiskey and stir gently to combine. Next float a layer of whipped cream over the coffee by pouring the cream gently and slowly over the back of a spoon. Serve immediately.



Irish Coffee Mousse Pie with Whiskey Whipped Cream

This spectacular dessert is easy to make, can be prepared a day ahead, and is the perfect end to any meal. Pair it with Irish Coffee and your worries will fade away. If you don't want to make the crust, buy a premade graham cracker pie crust.

Makes one pie, serves 6 to 8; Approximate calories per slice: 525. Prep Time: 30 minutes; Cook Time: 5 minutes; Chill Time: 2 1/2 hours; Total Time: 3 hours, 5 minutes.

INGREDIENTS

For the Graham Cracker Crust

- 1 ½ cups graham cracker crumbs
- 5 Tablespoons unsalted butter

For the Mousse Filling

- 1 ½ cups heavy whipping cream, divided
- 5 ounces semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 2 Tablespoons Irish whiskey
- 2 Tablespoons powdered sugar

For the Whiskey Whipped Cream Topping

- 1 cup heavy whipping cream
- 2 Tablespoons granulated sugar
- 1 ½ Tablespoons Irish whiskey
- Optional decorations: decorating sugar, cocoa or espresso powder, chocolate curls

DIRECTIONS

For the Crust

Melt the butter in the bottom of a 9-inch pie pan. Combine the graham cracker crumbs and butter until thoroughly mixed. Next, firmly press mixture into the base and up the sides of the pan. Chill for at least 30 minutes.

For the Mousse Filling

Pour 3/4 cup of the whipping cream into a medium microwave safe bowl. Microwave for about one minute. Check after 30 seconds, repeat at 10 second intervals until the cream is steaming, but not boiling; remove from microwave. Add the chocolate chips and stir until all the chocolate is melted and is thoroughly combined with the cream. Allow mixture to cool to room temperature. Stir in the whiskey. In a small bowl, whip the remaining 3/4 cup of cream with the powdered sugar until soft peaks form. Gently fold the whipped cream into the chocolate mixture until combined. Pour the filling over the graham cracker crumb base. Chill for 2 hours.

For the Whiskey Whipped Cream Topping

In a medium bowl, whip cream until soft mounds form. Gradually add sugar, whipping until stiff peaks form. Gently fold in whiskey. Carefully spread the topping evenly over the chilled pie. Chill until ready to serve. If desired, decorate pie with your choice of toppings.

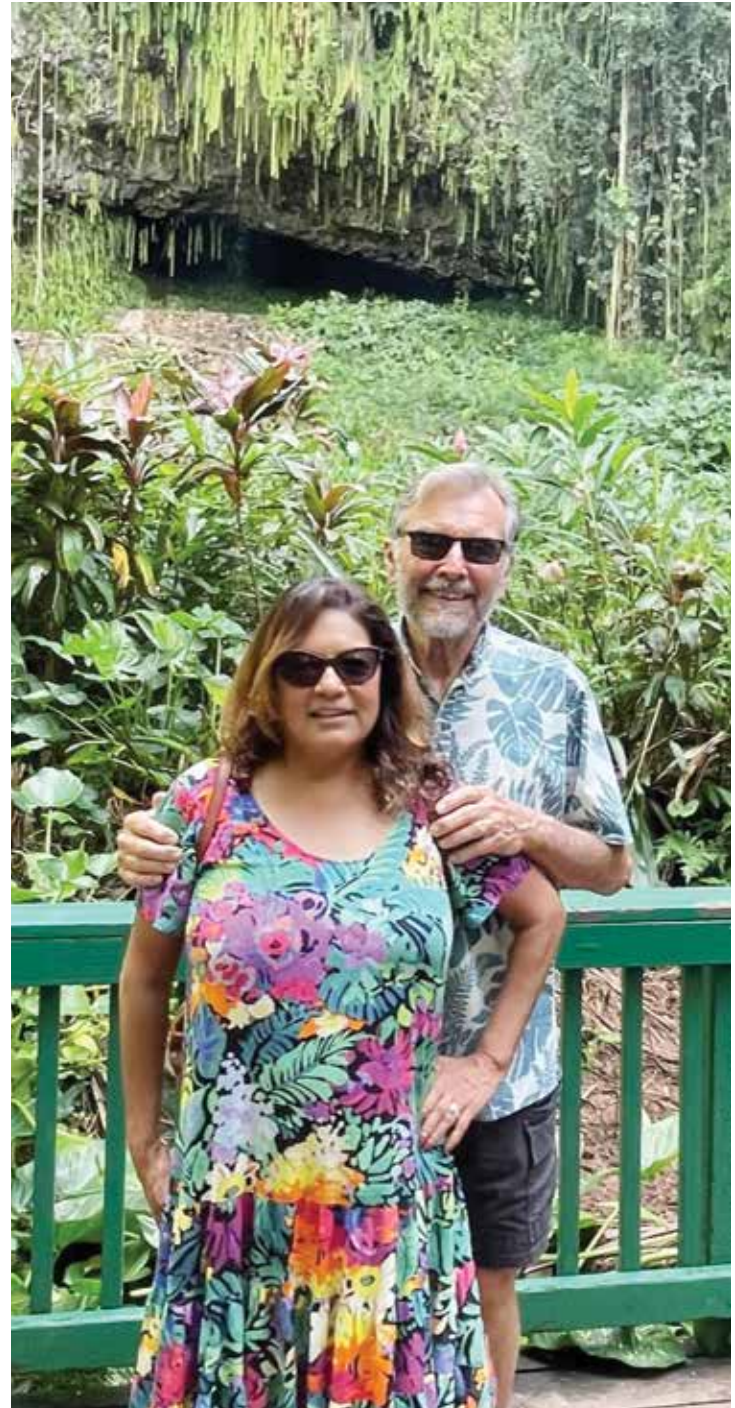

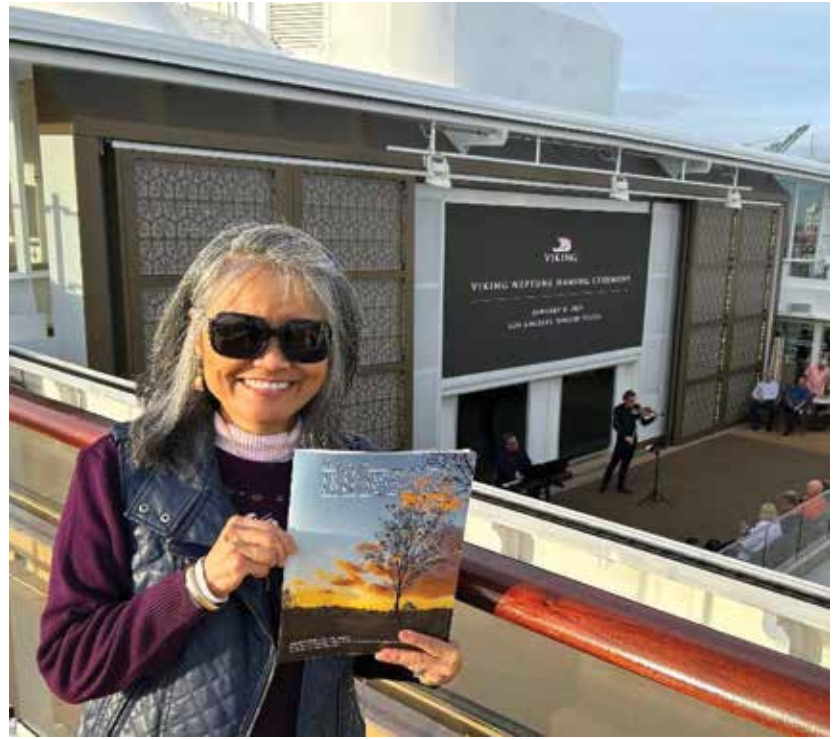

You need one gallon of water per person per day. The minimum is three days storage; the optimum is 14 days storage. We will be discussing how to obtain and store your emergency water. There are two ways to obtain drinking water. The first is to purchase commercially bottled water. The second is to fill your own bottles. If you fill your own bottles you should change them every six months. Sick persons, pregnant women, and small children may need additional water.

If you do not buy your water, there are three ways to make it safe. You can boil it, disinfect it, or you can distill it if no clean water is readily available. You must be sure that your water containers are safe: make sure that they can tightly seal, they are not made of breakable glass, or are containers that held toxic solids or liquid chemicals like bleach or pesticides. Do not use plastic or cardboard jugs. Your storage containers must be washed, rinsed, and sanitized.

1. Wash with dish washing soap and rinse with clean water.
2. Sanitize them using one teaspoon of unscented liquid bleach in

one quart of water.

3. Place the lid on the container and shake it up thoroughly so that it covers all of the storage container.

4. Wait 30 seconds and empty the sanitizer from the container.

5. Let the container air dry or rinse the container with clean, safe water that is readily available.

Proper Water Storage

1. Date and label your stored water.
2. Replace commercially bottled water every six months.
3. Store your water in a cool and dry place.
4. Do not store your water containers in direct sunlight.
5. Do not store water near toxic substances or pesticides.

SAFETY COMMITTEE SAFETY 4 "ALL" SEASONS



Safe driving should always be a priority in our neighborhood. To reinforce our commitment to safe driving, the Safety Committee is providing you with some safety tips to follow while operating your electric and gas-powered carts.

Electric & Gas-Powered Cart Safety Tips:

All residents should be familiar with the operation of their electric or gas-powered cart prior to operating the vehicle.

In addition, please follow these guidelines:

• Check or inspect your electric or gas-powered cart prior to operation to ensure that:

- Brakes are functioning properly.
- Tires are in good condition, not worn or under inflated.
- Horn and lights are operational.
- Mirrors (and windshield, if equipped) are clean and in good repair.
- Power supply cord and plug are not damaged.

Note: Don't operate the cart if it's not in good operating condition!

• Ensure that all passengers are sitting in designated, permanently-installed seats.

• Prior to starting the cart, look over both shoulders and check the mirrors to make sure that all passengers are fully and properly seated and ensure that pedestrians are away from the sides of the cart.

• If applicable, do not load equipment on the cart bed such that it obstructs your vision (not stacking above provided guardrails is a good guideline). Ensure that all equipment and materials are secured and will not shift while the cart is in motion.

• Obey all traffic signs and pavement markings. Never drive faster than it is safe or only as fast as conditions allow.

• While the cart is moving, ensure that all passengers are fully and properly seated and that all parts of their body remain inside the envelope of the cart.

Note: Do not exit the cart until it is completely stopped.

- Avoid standing water, potholes, bumps, loose gravel, or sand.
- Yield to all vehicle and pedestrian traffic.

• Slow down and yield to cross traffic at all unmarked or blind intersections.

Additional Reminders:

• Drivers, please refrain from eating, using phones, or operating handheld devices while driving.

• When leaving your cart unattended for extended periods of time, it is a good idea to install a locking device on your steering wheel... many cart keys are interchangeable and could be used to drive off with your cart.

• It is recommended only licensed drivers operate electric or gas-powered carts.

• Do not forget... this isn't Mr. Toad's Wild Ride! Children should NEVER be allowed to drive these vehicles.

Apps for security and talking to that guy at Stater's

There's an app lurking around our neighborhood at night. Okay, lurking isn't a fair description, but I use the word in hopes of getting your attention. I really should say there's an app patrolling our neighborhood at night. Actually, that's not correct either in that an app can do a lot of things but only when enabled by its user. In this case, the user is a member of Securitas, our private guard service.

Let me explain. I can't remember the exact time, but early one morning when it was still dark, I was walking to our local mailbox when I noticed a Securitas guard stop in front of the mailbox, get out of his car, and walk to the side of the box. He had some kind of device in his hand which he seemed to wave at the box. Later, in the light of day, I looked at the side of the mailbox and saw a round piece of metal attached to the mailbox.

I was all too prepared to assume a smartphone app was involved, but being the ace reporter that I am, I stopped by the guardhouse at the main gate and asked the guard about what I observed. He told me the guards use a special app on their phones which logs the time and location when the phone is in close proximity to the disc. Cool!

Isn't it fascinating the variety of uses apps perform in our lives. You can imagine the complexity of creating a system Securitas would have to go through to duplicate the function enabled by just having an app on a smartphone.

But...

Stop the presses. Here's an absolute first. I was making a pit stop at the new Stater Bros. in Calimesa. Yes, pit stop. Considering that I start each morning with large glass of water and 18 ounces of coffee (coming up, perhaps in June, you'll learn about my appreciation for the quality of Nespresso coffee) and taking into account that I'm 80 years old, when I'm riding my bike and when, as I was on the

day in question, on my weekly CVP (Beaumont Citizen Volunteer Patrol) assignment, I've come to discover suitable pit stops throughout Banning, Beaumont, and Redlands.

On this particular day, I noticed an array of side dishes displayed near the Stater's exit. I saw one of my favorite dim sum dishes Pork bao. (I'm not sure pork bao qualifies as a dish, but let's put that issue aside.

And if you don't know what dim sum is, I encourage you to find a Chinese restaurant that specializes in it to treat yourself to the variety of small servings of delicious steamed and baked dim sum items.) I decided to buy the package, and I wondered how best to heat them. I later realized I could find this information out just by looking at the bottom of the tray. But that would have negated the reason for this column.

There was an employee arranging the items on display so I asked him what was the best way to heat the bao. He signaled, "wait a minute" and pulled out his phone. After he logged in, he opened an app and signaled me to talk into the phone. I asked the question again which translated my request into, I suppose, Chinese displayed on his phone. He spoke into his phone which then translated and displayed what he said. "Microwave for three to five minutes." I think we were using an Android phone, and the app was probably Google Translate. That app will also work on an iPhone. Apple has its own app called Apple Translate, which can translate among 11 languages.

I've known about, and referred to, translation apps in prior columns, but I imagined using them on a trip outside the US. This experience demonstrated how shortsighted I've been.

TAILS & TRAILS - ALL PETS

One of the most beautiful parts of having a pet is the human-animal bond that develops. For many people, a pet is considered part of the family. Anyone who has pushed their dog or cat down the sidewalk in a stroller, let their pet sleep in their bed (or even under the covers), stayed up late with their pet after surgery or when that pet is feeling sick, knows how important this family member is.

When cats or dogs, or any pet, become part of our family, the last thing we're thinking about is how their time on earth will end. Sadly though, it's something all pet parents must eventually face. If you're at the point where you may be considering pet euthanasia (putting your pet to sleep), you know it is a hard decision to make. At-home pet euthanasia is an option many pet owners are not aware of and there are many places, locally, that provide this special service. At-home pet euthanasia services are designed to make the process as peaceful and stress-free as possible, for both you and your pet.

Many people want their pet's last moments to be in their home with their family. You can decide what is best for your pet's passing — in their bed, on your lap, surrounded by favorite toys. You can even feed a last, favorite treat. When the veterinarian arrives, they will explain the euthanasia process. Usually two injections are given. The first one sedates the pet so their body relaxes, and they drift to sleep over the course of three to five minutes. The second injection is the euthanasia solution. Afterwards, you are given alone time to

spend with your pet. Finally, the hospice veterinarian will take your pet and transport them for cremation or for burial, depending on which service you choose. Perhaps the most difficult question you will grapple with is when you should put your pet to sleep. An at-home euthanasia works best when you can plan it before it becomes an emergency situation. BIRDING CLUB

The rare White-throated Sparrow that first appeared at my feeder on Nov. 10 continued sporadically through this writing (Feb. 5). On Jan. 23, I spotted a Townsend's Solitaire on Trail A, a first record and Four Seasons species #123! During our bird walk on Feb. 4, the sun was shining and lots of birds were singing — it felt like the first day of spring in SoCal. It took longer than usual to cover Trails A and B because we were stopping so often to look at birds and we finished the morning with a whopping 27 species. The highlight was great looks at two and possibly three adult male Allen's Hummingbirds. Other highlights included Cedar Waxwings and a well camouflaged

Great Horned Owl spotted by Kathy Hull. Later in the day, Gerrie Karczynski, Barbara Wasco and I spotted eight additional species, bringing the day's total to 35 species, a new record for a February bird walk! The highlight was Gerrie Karczynski's sighting and photographing of a Townsend's Solitaire at Veterans Park, almost certainly the same bird first spotted on Trail A on Jan. 23 (our Bird of the Month). Other highlights included Dark-eyed Juncos, Lawrence's Goldfinches, and Pine Siskins. ~ **Steve Edelman**, steve.h.edelman@gmail.com

BIRD OF THE MONTH

Townsend's Solitaire is a gray, medium-sized thrush with a white eye ring. Its white outer tail feathers are prominent in flight and its upright posture and long tail when perched give it a long, slender appearance. The song is complex and finch-like, with short, rich warbles that change abruptly in pitch. Townsend's Solitaire eats insects and spiders during the breeding season and switches to fruit, especially juniper and other berries, during the non-breeding (winter) season.

Townsend's Solitaires are year-round residents of mountains in the western U.S. and

adjacent south-westernmost Canada and the Sierra Madre of Mexico. In summer, part of the population migrates north to the Canadian Rockies and Alaska, where they breed in coniferous forests. During the non-breeding (winter) season, part of the population migrates to lower elevations across almost the entire western half of the U.S. and north-central Mexico. Townsend's Solitaire breeds in our local mountains, so the wintering bird that was first spotted on Jan. 23 on Trail A and photographed on Feb. 4 at Veterans Park by Gerrie Karczynski may have bred nearby, such as around Big Bear Lake, or maybe in Alaska!

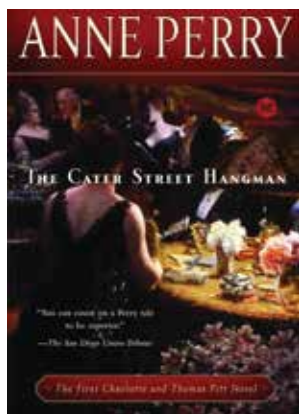

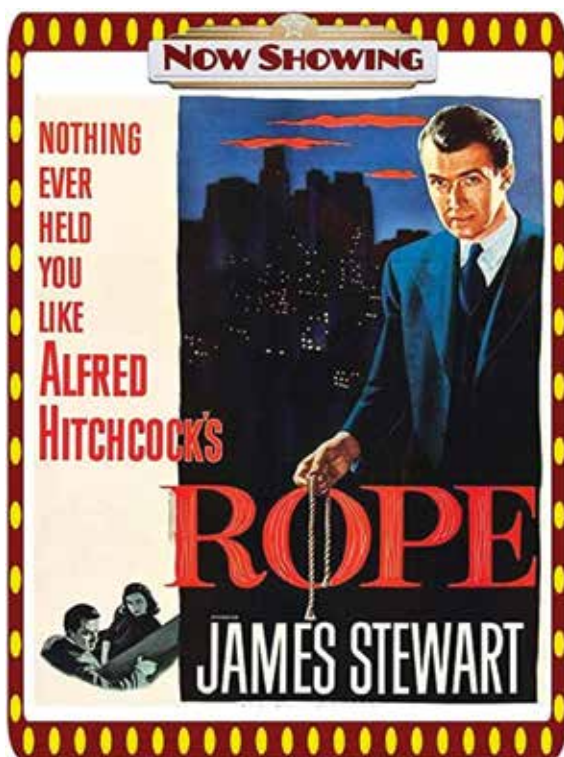
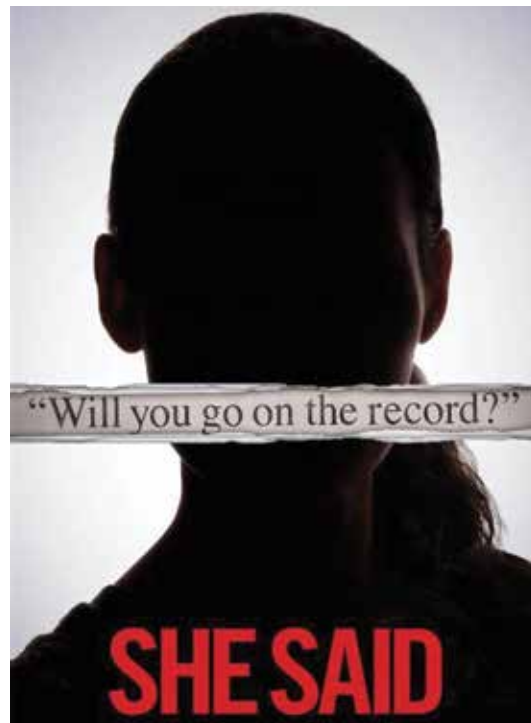
COUNTER CULTURE CINEMA CLUB

COUNTRY LINE DANCING



We have several new dances that are working both our feet and our brains. Dancing is a combination of learning approximately 32 steps for each dance we do. Some of the steps are used frequently, like the grapevine, and some only occasionally. Each of our classes usually do six dances per class. Even if you only do the beginner class, that is a total of 192 steps. That is where the brain kicks in. As you learn each dance, the brain memorizes the dance steps and pattern that go with that music. And the really great thing about dancing is that once you do a dance a lot, there is muscle memory too. The music starts and you just start doing the steps that go with the music! You hardly have to think about the steps. You probably don't believe me, but ask a dancer; it really does happen.

But everyone must start at the beginning, learning the basic steps. Our instructors are patient and take the time to demonstrate the steps until the class knows them. The rest is up to you.

Practice each dance until you know it by heart. If you have a problem step or group of steps, ask for it to be demonstrated again. Attending class is the starting point, but practice makes the dances almost automatic.

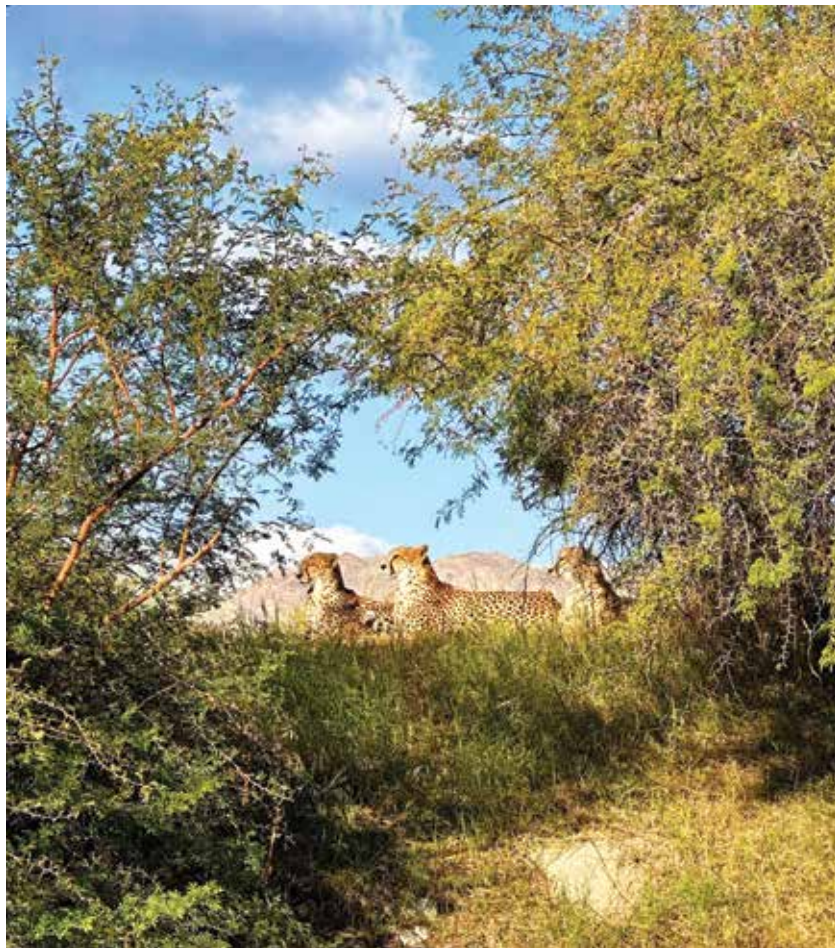

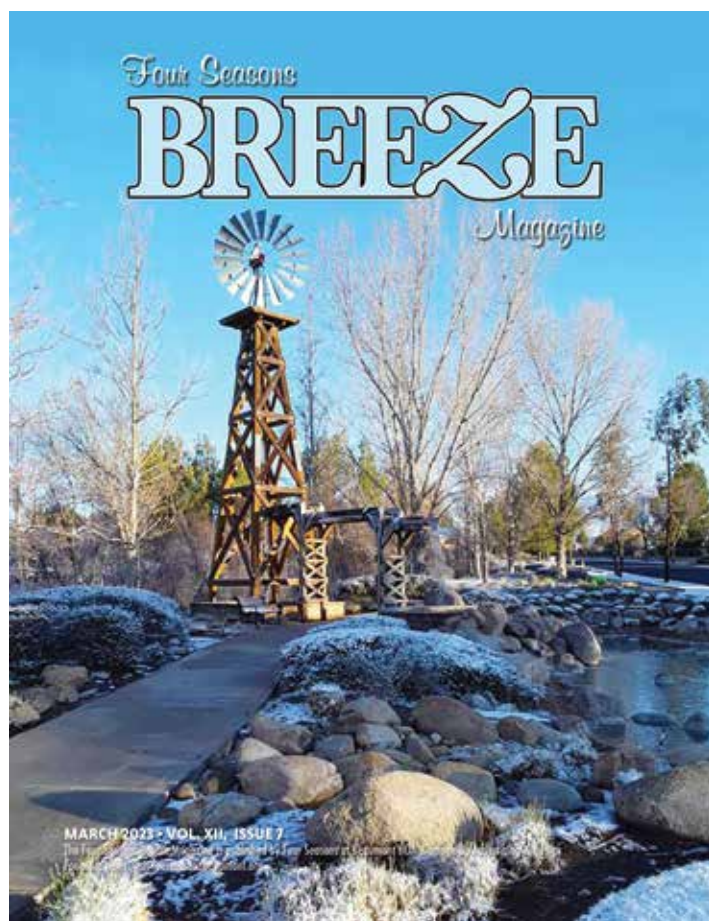
