



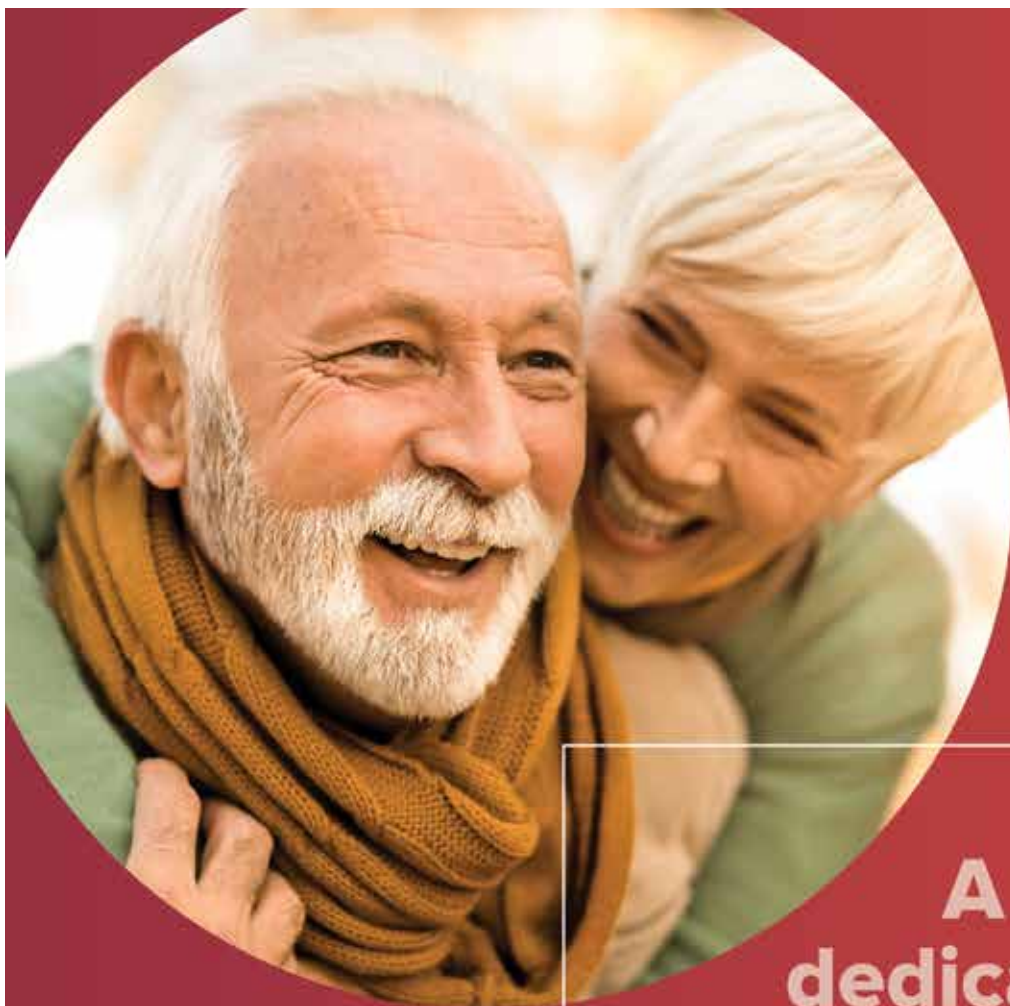

MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD

The weather in February and early March was extremely cold with lots of rain and a little bit of snow. The hills surrounding us are beautifully covered with snow, and as of this writing, more rain is very possible.

Our gas bills were extremely high, and as promised by the gas company, the amount for the gas has lowered a little. Additionally, our gas bills should have a credit of approximately \$50 to offset the cost of the natural gas. Many of our residents have contacted me about the lower gas bill this month and have stated they have lowered their thermostats to reduce consumption. Others have applied for the Level Pay Plan or one of the assistance programs the gas company provides. The main thing is that we stay safe and healthy during this unusually cold weather for our area.

The solar Purchase Power Agreement (PPA) vote was 922 Yes and 312 No to allow the Board of Directors to negotiate a contract for solar power at our three facilities. Many people made suggestions at the Town Hall meeting and have contacted the FirstService Management staff and Board members with additional suggestions on the location of the solar panels, the Trinary Capital Group, and the solar company.

We have discussed many of the suggestions with members of our community and are reviewing ways to improve the HOA position as we go forward. There is no contract in place at the time this article was written. Thank you to all the residents who voted. Whether you voted yes or no, the important thing is you participated and had your voices heard.

The Highland Springs Interchange Project to reduce delays and congestion that is currently experienced at the I-10/Highland Springs Avenue interchange is moving forward. The project will take into consideration the traffic increases expected over the next 20 years without having to widen the existing bridge structure.

This is a cooperative project between the Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC) and the cities of Beaumont and Banning. Obtaining planning, environmental, and engineering

approval requires three phases:

1. The Project Study Report — This identifies potential alternatives to provide congestion relief. It also looks at the potential environmental impact and cost associated with alternatives. This was approved in December 2021.
2. Project Approval/Environment Documentation (PAED) — The environmental document for the project is approved and the preferred alternative is selected. This began in September 2022.
3. Final Plans and Engineering — Final phase of engineering which comes after approval of the environmental documentation. This is expected to take two years and will begin in 2024.

The funding for the project will be approximately \$3 million for the Project Study Report and PAED, which has been funded. The \$3.5 million for the final engineering and then \$25-30 million for the construction are currently unfunded. As you can see, this project's completion will be down the road several years.

The Construction Defect Lawsuit against K. Hovnanian is still in progress with depositions by FirstService Management and an HOA Board representative. The areas of our concern include the roadways, facility buildings, sidewalks, and trees. Currently, we do not have a date for trial readiness, but it is possible this lawsuit could be resolved before the end of this year. As we progress further, we will update the information as authorized by the attorneys representing the HOA.

The Board of Directors meets on the second Thursday of each month in an open session at 1 pm in The Lodge Ballroom. We also have an informal meeting at the RCN on the third Wednesday of each month where residents can discuss topics and ask questions of the Board members in attendance. These informal sessions allow the Board members to respond and participate in a question and answer period, which the more formal sessions do not permit.

BANNING WAREHOUSE UPDATE

The court case involving the city of Banning, Creation Equity, and the Pass Action Group (PAG) is continuing. Randy Robbins of the PAG Steering Committee has advised me that the developer's response to the PAG's brief has been received.

There was a Town Hall in February at Sun Lakes. This meeting was attended by a large number of residents of Sun Lakes and other residents of Banning and Beaumont. The PAG briefed the attendees on the progress of the case and what is currently pending.

The PAG had until March 9 to respond to the developer's brief in court. A hearing may be held in April or May. As you can see, the case is moving through the court system.

The PAG had a fundraising dinner on March 26. Such events are

an important part of the process of fundraising to enable the PAG to pay for legal and other expenses incurred in fighting the warehouse project.

The PAG is current on all expenses thanks to the great support received in Sun Lakes and other areas of Banning and Beaumont. Fundraising is ongoing. However, there are other deductions and considerations to keep in mind as well for both federal and state taxes; an increased standard deduction, a different filing threshold, the Social Security Tax Exemption, business and hobby deductions, medical expense deductions, the Elderly or Disabled Tax Credit, charitable deductions, retirement plan contribution benefits, the Estate and Gift Tax, and state senior tax exemptions, among many others. Additionally, the IRS's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) and Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) programs offer free basic tax return preparation to qualified individuals. These programs offer free tax help, particularly for those who are 60 years of age and older, specializing in questions about pensions and retirement-related issues unique to seniors.

DID YOU KNOW that April showers bring May flowers? That old adage doesn't necessarily ring true, though, especially in warmer climates. Scientists note there's one factor that's much more important than rainfall in determining when a particular flower will bloom: temperature. When the average temperature begins to approach spring-like weather, flowers will begin to bloom, regardless of exactly how much rain they received in April or the month before they began to bloom. No need to do away with such a productive turn-of-phrase, though! Rather than being rooted in botany, this nostalgic saying can serve as a simple way to avoid the blahs of rainy weather by focusing, instead, on the beauty of better weather ahead.

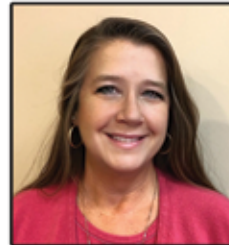

SEVEN LAYER SALAD



Are you planning to serve a ham for Easter and need to decide how to use the leftovers? Ham is so versatile that it can be used in any number of dishes for any meal. I adapted a family recipe for salad by substituting ham for the bacon and adding shredded carrots to add texture. This salad dish is great for any gathering. It can be a light side dish for a holiday meal, served as a main course, or taken to a potluck. The salad is served in a glass container, either a bowl or baking dish so each layer is visible. Therefore, make sure all your layers are spread to the edge.

Seven-layer salad has been around for decades. It was named for its seven colorful layers. Traditional seven-layer salad always contains iceberg lettuce, peas, eggs, cheese, and bacon covered with a coating of mayonnaise. There are many variants of this salad using additional or fewer ingredients. Popular variations include romaine, spinach, or basil instead of iceberg. Other variants include ingredients such as bell peppers, carrots, mushrooms, tomatoes, and other types of cheeses or meats. The point is this salad can be made with whatever ingredients you prefer. Play with your food, tantalize your taste buds, and most importantly enjoy the meal. Prep Time: 15 minutes; Cook Time: 20 Minutes; Total Time: 35 minutes plus chilling time; Chilling time 1 hour to overnight. Serves 10 to 12.

INGREDIENTS

For the dressing

- 2 cups mayonnaise
- 2 Tablespoons apple cider vinegar
- 2 to 3 drops hot sauce, optional
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 2 teaspoons granulated sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

For the salad

- 8 cups coarsely chopped lettuce, about 1 head iceberg or 12 ounces romaine
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced red onion
- 1 1/2 cups shredded carrots
- 1 10-ounce package frozen peas, thawed (I used cooked and shelled edamame)
- 4 to 6 hardboiled eggs, peeled and sliced or chopped
- 2 cups chopped ham or 1/2 to 3/4-pound bacon, fried and crumbled
- 1/2 cup shredded smoked gouda or cheddar cheese

DIRECTIONS

For the dressing

Prepare the dressing by whisking together the mayonnaise, apple cider vinegar, hot sauce, Parmesan, garlic powder, sugar, seasoned salt, and pepper in a medium bowl, set aside.

For the salad

Spread the lettuce evenly in the bottom of a glass bowl or 13" x 9" baking dish. Top lettuce with layers of onion, carrots, peas, and eggs.

Evenly spread dressing over the salad mixture. Top with the cheese, then the ham or bacon. Cover and chill at least one hour to overnight.

To serve, use salad tongs that will allow you to reach down through all the layers.

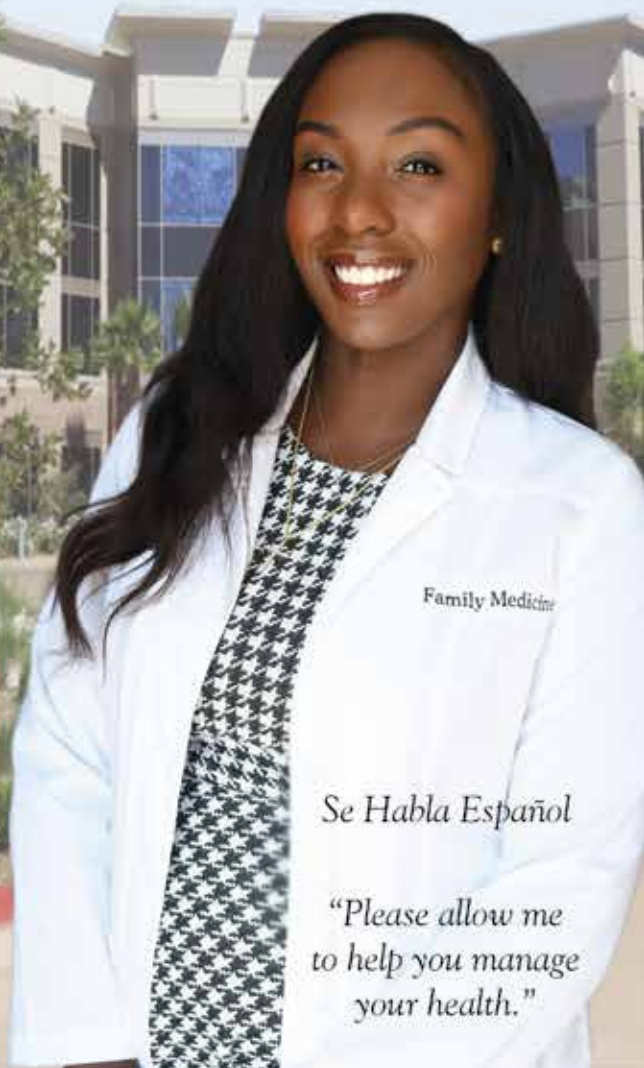

SPRING WEATHER

With a rather wet and cold winter nearing an end, what does the spring hold in store for us? The National Climate Prediction Center (CPC) provides seasonal outlooks for temperature and precipitation, and their recent outlook is shown in the figures below. While in recent years, the CPC projections tend to be on the warm and dry side, that is not the case for the upcoming spring months.

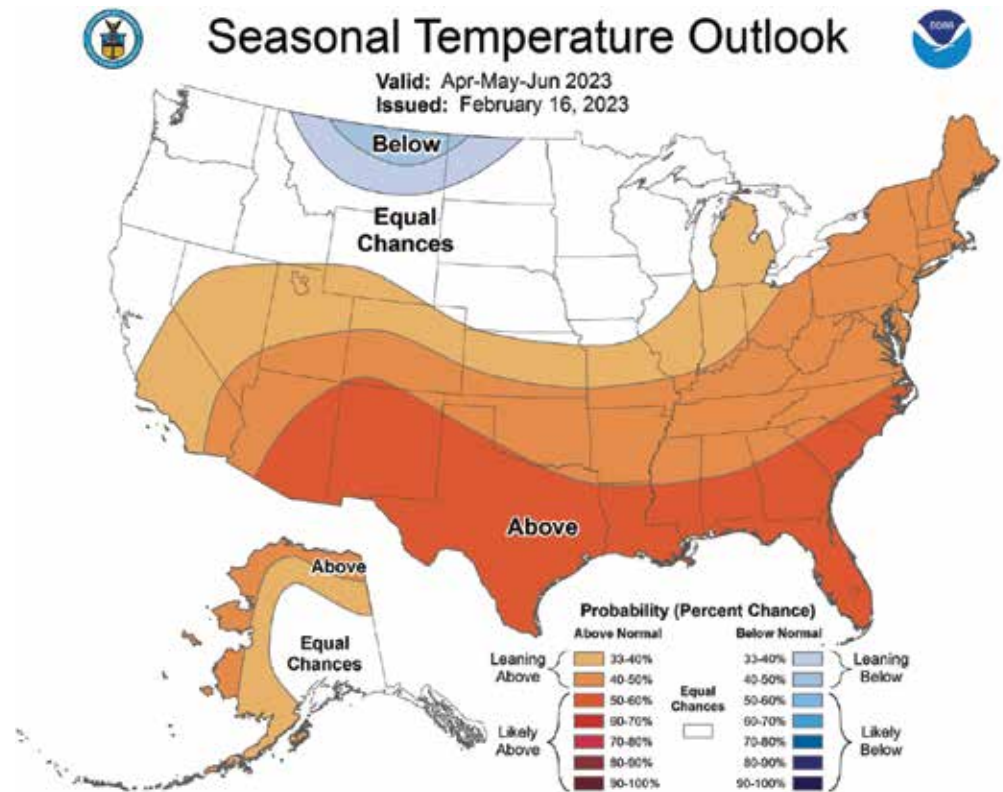


Figure 1. Temperature outlook for spring

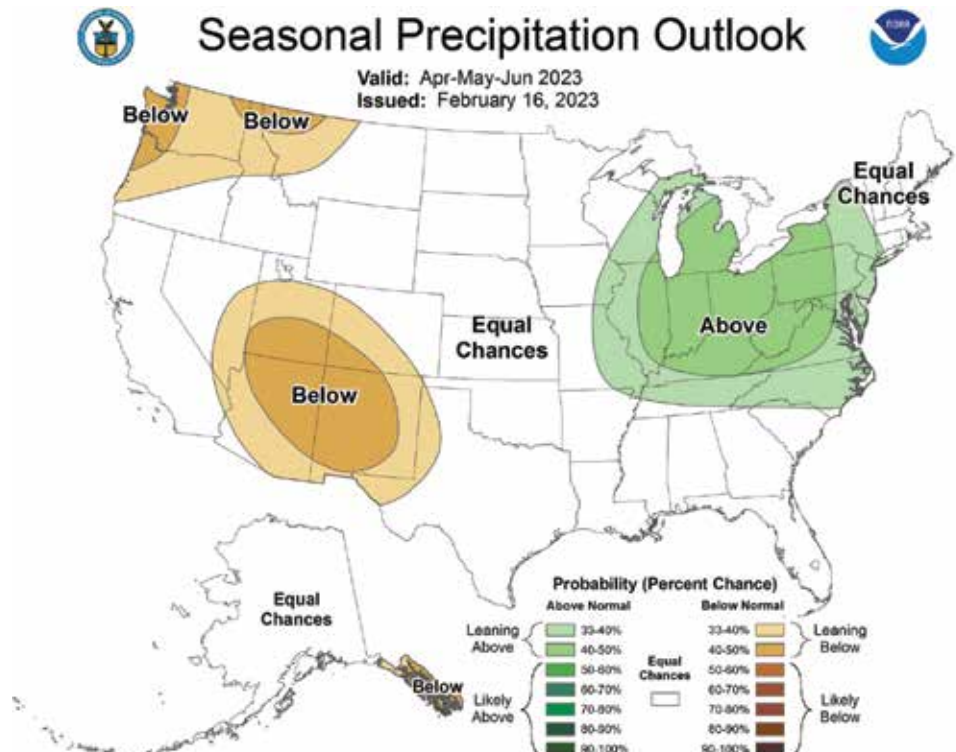
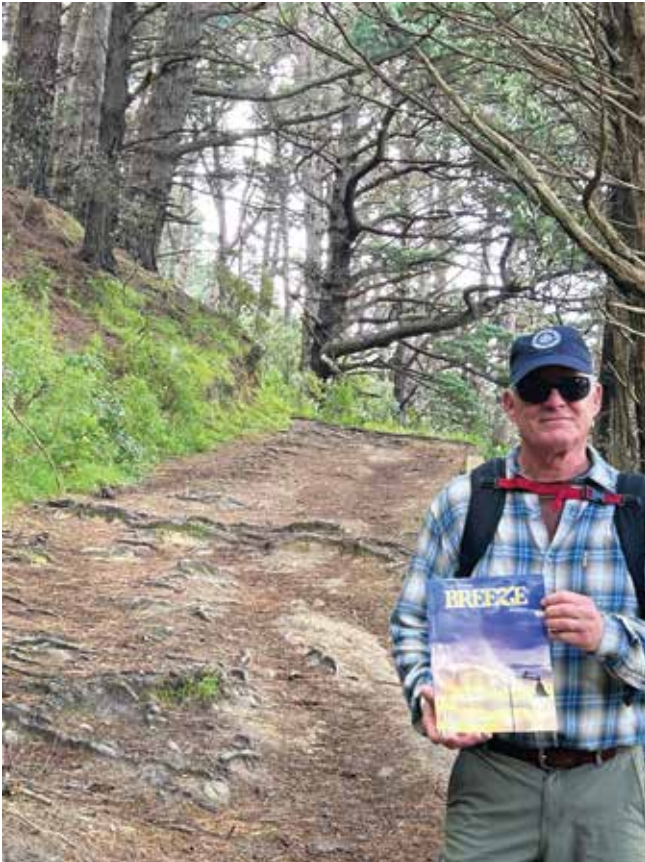


Figure 2. Precipitation outlook for spring

As shown in Figure 1, temperatures for Southern California are indicated to have a slightly greater chance of above normal temperatures, while the greatest chances of above normal temperatures this year are projected for the southern tier of states from Arizona to Florida. For precipitation, as shown in Figure 2, all of California is indicated to have equal chances of above normal and below normal precipitation. This is in sharp contrast to previous recent years where California has been solidly in the below normal category.

So, if there is such a thing as a "normal" spring, these projections indicate we might actually have one!

ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW COMMITTEE

What a winter. If your home is anything like mine, the winter storms and cold caused a lot of damage to my plants. As stated in the ARC Guidelines 1.A.(4) "Prior to the commencement of any exterior work of any type, Owners must first make an application to the ARC for approval."

This means that all changes, including landscaping and changes to the hardscape, fences, and buildings must obtain ARC approval. If you are simply replacing dead or old plants with the same or similar plants, you do not need approval.

For example, if your boxwoods died and you want to replace them with rose bushes in the same location, you will need approval. If your mature 5 foot tall boxwoods died and you are replacing them with new 18 inch boxwoods, you don't need approval. The difference is the rosebushes are a new variety, while the boxwoods are a replacement of the same variety.

On to the subject of solar. If you are trying to install solar before the net metering change effective April 15, you should have either completed the installation or have received ARC approval and your contractor has the application into the city and utility companies. While ARC does not believe you can meet the deadline, ARC will

continue to process solar installation applications following our established dates and processes.

ARC expects to see more applications for the installation of artificial turf due to the drought and watering restrictions. Several homeowners in the community have made this change. Guidelines Exhibit I sets forth the minimum requirements for this installation. Copies of this document are available online at www.fourseasons.org under the HOA tab or a hard copy can be picked up at The Lodge or the RCN management office.

Finally, many homeowners may have to touch up or repaint their homes. Please remember that all repainting requires ARC approval (including repainting the same color as exists). Color sample books are available for check out at The Lodge front desk. While you may use paint from any manufacturer, it must be an exact match to the approved colors not just close. (All paint stores can mix paint to the exact formula/color, as approved by ARC.)

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS COMMITTEE

BE PREPARED: Emergency Preparedness is a balancing act. Things go sideways quickly if you are caught unprepared. In order to be prepared, you must be able to store extra supplies and equipment. You will need space to do this. This means that you try and guess what you may need so you know what to store.

The recent train derailment in Ohio and the 100-year snow storms in California are a reminder of this. These are two different incidents that had opposite results. The derailment damaged tank cars carrying hazardous gas, resulting in an evacuation of nearby residents and businesses. The record snowfall resulted in a largely unwanted shelter-in-place.

In the event of an emergency, everyone who lives to the south of Interstate 10 between Beaumont Avenue and Highland Springs may have problems accessing their property. Closed off-ramps and freeway lanes result in detours on city streets. When there are too many people trying to detour outside of our gates, we are almost

trapped here inside Four Seasons.

Cal Trans roadwork and even an extra long freight train recently made access to Sixth Street in Beaumont almost impossible. You need to have enough supplies at home to keep yourself safe and comfortable before necessary repairs can be made. If you leave your home, you should have a go-kit with plenty of food and water in it.

Many of you have attended Neighborhood Watch presentations from Cal Trans, the city of Beaumont and Union Pacific Railroad. Each of these companies and organizations told us that they are doing the best they can to keep the traffic flowing. The problem is that they all act independently from one another. A little bit of cooperation may help alleviate a potential problem.

SAFETY COMMITTEE SAFETY 4 “ALL” SEASONS

Hello friends!

Following the recent earthquakes and aftershocks that hit Turkey, we thought it would be timely to provide you with some tips to prepare you for an earthquake that could strike our area at any time.

Earthquake Preparedness Tips:

No matter where you are, know how to protect yourself and your family during an earthquake.

- Practice taking cover as if there were an earthquake and learn the safest places in your home and work.
- Practice getting out of your home and check to see if the planned exits are clear and if they can become blocked in an earthquake.
- Practice turning off your electricity and water. Note: The water shutoff valve is typically located below the hose bib location in the garage or front of house. The Electrical Service Disconnect is found on the Main Breaker panel located on the exterior wall of the garage.
- Know how to turn off the gas, but do not practice this step. In the event of an earthquake, once you turn off your gas, only your utility company should turn it back on for safety reasons.

Things to Consider:

- When in a HIGH-RISE BUILDING, move against an interior wall if you are not near a desk or table. Protect your head and neck with your arms. Do not use the elevators.
- When OUTDOORS, move to a clear area away from trees, signs, buildings, or downed electrical wires and poles.
- When on a SIDEWALK NEAR BUILDINGS, duck into a doorway to protect yourself from falling bricks, glass, plaster, and other debris.
- When DRIVING, pull over to the side of the road and stop. Avoid overpasses and power lines. Stay inside your vehicle until the shaking stops.
- When in a CROWDED STORE OR OTHER PUBLIC PLACE, move away from display shelves containing objects that could fall. Do not

rush for the exit.

- When in a STADIUM OR THEATER, stay in your seat, get below the level of the back seat and cover your head and neck with your arms.

Don't forget to...

DUCK: DUCK or DROP down on the floor.

COVER: Take COVER under a sturdy desk, table or other furniture.

If that is not possible, seek cover against an interior wall and protect your head and neck with your arms. Avoid danger spots near windows, hanging objects, mirrors, or tall furniture.

HOLD: If you take cover under a sturdy piece of furniture, HOLD on to it and be prepared to move with it. Hold the position until the ground stops shaking, and it is safe to move.

Just remember, earthquakes are not planned events. Prepare and plan for the unexpected:

- It is a good idea to have a three-day supply of food and water available if roads and transportation corridors are inaccessible, making travel to supermarkets unavailable.
- Have an out-of-state contact everyone in your family or household can contact should local phone or mobile service be unavailable or shut down.

CONSERVANCY

CONTROLLING EROSION The clay soil banks of our Potrero Creek and its feeder stream (S branch) are subject to erosion. During construction of Four Seasons, artificial slopes were installed to slow erosion without diminishing the energy of the flowing water.

A gabion is a cage, cylinder, or box filled with rocks, concrete, or sometimes sand and soil for protecting banks of water courses.

Riprap, also known as rip rap, rip-rap, shot rock, rock armour (in British English) or rubble, is human-placed rock or other material used to protect shoreline structures against scour and water, wave, or ice erosion. Ripraps are used to armor shorelines, stream beds, bridge abutments, foundational infrastructure supports and other shoreline structures.

Riprap affects the amount of organic material in a waterbody by acting as a filter, catching wood and leaves before they can enter the water. Riprap also covers and prevents plants from growing through, which can reduce shade over the water.

Introducing ripraps creates a rocky environment which can affect the ecology of a waterbody by making the ecosystem more heterogeneous. While it can negatively affect some organisms by removing shoreline vegetation, the rock can provide important refuge for invertebrates and small fish. By preventing woody plants from growing and shading the water, riprap can also increase the amount of algae and hydrophytes. ~ *Len Tavernetti, ltavernetti@hotmail.com*

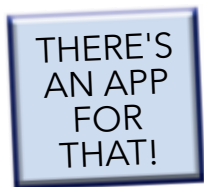

Sometimes I don't know I need an app until I need it. What?! Every once in a while, I need an app I didn't know I needed. Here's the situation, or am I being obtuse (you remember *Shawshank Redemption?*).

After Apple enlarged the size of the screen of its smaller iMac all-in-one computer, I thought it was only a matter of time until they increased the size of its larger iMac screen. The one that I'd owned for years. So, you can imagine my disappointment when I learned they are not only not increasing its size, Apple will no longer offer a larger iMac. What they did instead is split the computer into two pieces. Okay, maybe you can't imagine my disappointment, but at least you can accept my scenario.

I could deal with splitting its former all-in-one computer into two pieces if Apple increased the size of the monitor now sold separately. But no. In Apple's infinite wisdom, they now offer a souped-up, black-box computer with a separate monitor exactly the same size as the one I've had for years. And even more outrageous, the new same-size monitor costs almost as much as the complete iMac used to cost.

The solution? I didn't buy either the new black box or the new 27-inch monitor. Instead, I got a much cheaper Mac Mini cigar-box-size computer with a 32-inch monitor made by a company called BenQ. One thing I'll say about Apple products: they are made to operate at peak performance without much adjustment. My old iMac had a brightness adjustment, and that was about it. On the other hand, my new BenQ monitor has two separate types of signal inputs and has all sorts of settings for each. Because I work in a well-lit room, I wanted the monitor set to its highest brightness. But the brightness levels kept changing as I made various adjustments.

So, which setting leads to the brightest picture? In my old photography days, I owned a light meter, and that would have been just the ticket. I wondered if there's an app for that. So, I looked up "light meter" in the app store, and sure enough, an app called Light Meter turned up. I installed it, held it in front of my monitor with one hand while I changed settings with my other hand. Easy peasy. I had the best setting in two minutes.

The Light Meter app is pretty basic. It's configured like my old light meter and gives a numeric readout in LUX. Now if you want to be very accurate, the app wants you to build a light diffuser to use with the app. In fact, the app displays an annoying message that a "Diffuser [is] Missing." I'm sure if you're aiming for perfection, you can follow the instruction video and easily build a diffuser. But for my purpose, I could read the number above the notice, and that worked fine for me. After all, I wasn't interested in the exact light output value as if I could use that number in another application.

All I wanted to know is what monitor setting resulted in the highest number. And that's what Light Meter allowed me to do.

By the way, at some point in the forgotten past, I had a similar problem. Only that time the issue wasn't measuring light output. I wanted to measure sound output. I'm sure I must have searched for "sound meter" in the app store, and I came up with Decibel X. Having been in the audio/video business for over 40 years, I knew a decibel is a unit of sound intensity measurement. This app is far more sophisticated than Light Meter. Its meter setting shows a continuous graph of the current sound levels with a typical VU (volume unit) meter display. And below that is a numeric display of average volume, current volume, and maximum volume. You can save sound levels you've recorded and view them by selecting Data. It even has a Dosimeter if you want that kind of reading. Dosimeter? Google it!

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH & COMMUNITY AWARENESS

Wow, what cold weather we have had in the past couple of months, but now we head into April. Hopefully it will bring us some April showers that lead into May flowers, but for sure, it will bring “tax season.” Our Beaumont police put out a community advisory on March 1 on mail theft. They listed excellent points to minimize mail theft so it is worth mentioning here.

Already there have been mail thefts reported to the Beaumont Police, and those reports have increased as tax season arrived. The continued rise in online shopping has made mailboxes an easy target for criminals. Criminals have easy access to your personal information through your bank statements, credit cards and more. The “porch pirates” can even take packages containing valuable items from your entryway.

Beaumont police suggest a few tips to keep your mail and packages safe:

- Check and empty your mailbox everyday.
- If you are going on vacation or out of town, you can request a vacation hold from the post office.
- Take outgoing mail directly to the post office, or in our case Four Seasons, place the outgoing mail in the appropriate mail slot at our mailboxes on the day mail is delivered. This way your outgoing mail will not be in our mailboxes overnight and your risk of theft of checks, payments or other items of value is minimized.
- Sign up for “Informed Delivery” by USPS. It is free and allows you to preview incoming mail, track packages, set up delivery instructions,



reschedule deliveries, etc.

- If you are not home to receive packages, have a trusted neighbor receive the package in person and not have it sit at your home's entryway.
- Report suspicious vehicles to the Beaumont Police Department's non-emergency line at (951) 769-8500, and call our management office to relay the information on the suspicious vehicle.

The Beaumont Police Department has provided these tips so that we can keep our mail, personal information, and other items safe from theft not only in tax season, but for the entire year.

Our next Neighborhood Watch meeting will be on April 12 at 10 am in The Lodge Ballroom. Our guest speaker will be from the city of Beaumont. Jack Huntsman, the Environmental Compliance Manager will present information on fats, oils, and grease awareness and proper disposal of those items. Please mark your calendar and plan on attending the presentation.

Beaumont Police will also be present to discuss briefly any current criminal activities in the Beaumont area.

Please be careful driving in our community. The speed limit on Four Seasons Circle is 30 mph, 25 mph on residential streets, including Green Creek Trail, and 15 mph in the alleys.

FOUR SEASONS SAFETY

Curious about our safety in our Four Seasons Community, especially in light of reported increasing violence in surrounding communities, I sought information from our Beaumont Police Department and other sources to find out if my high sense of safety is valid.

In an informal, quantitative survey, I asked residents, on a scale of 1, low, to 10, high, how safe they felt in living in our Four Seasons community. From about 100 responses, roughly 90% felt exceptionally safe at 10, 4% felt highly safe at 9, 4% felt strongly safe at 8, and 1% felt safe at 7. Thomas Olsen, living on the southern side of Four Seasons commented, “Sometimes in the open-spaced unincorporated area, I hear gun fire from folks doing target practice; but it doesn't really affect crime behind the gates.”

Marcedes Cashmer, Beaumont's police information officer, provided reassuring criminal statistics. In 2022, Beaumont had three homicides, 13 robberies, 118 felony assaults, 130 burglaries, 282 larceny or petty thefts (i.e., bikes, purses, wallets, tools, and other stolen items), and 83 vehicle thefts. Compared to other cities, these crime rates are relatively low.

According to the most recent data from the FBI, the total crime rate in Beaumont is 1,872 per 100,000 people. That's 20.20% lower than the national rate of 2,346 per 100,000 people and 27.47 lower than the California total crime rate of 2,581 per 100,000 (homesnacks.com/ca/Beaumont-crime).

Some long-term residents noted that during the completion of Four Season's phase five development, construction workers were coming and going. Sometimes the Breckenridge gate would be left open and many workers and other non-residents had access to the gate code. With phase five's completion in 2020, and the transition from digital-coded gate access to transponder-code gate access for all three Four Season gates, access to non-residents without authorization has been mitigated.

According to reliable sources, no reported murders, physical assaults, or home invasions have been reported since Four Seasons sold its first homes in 2005. It's been rumored that one owner left their keys in the car and the car was stolen.

General Manager Eric Zarr states, “The gates are a privacy feature, not a security feature. Crimes of opportunity happen. It's important to lock the doors of your vehicle and home, and to keep your garage door closed when unattended.”

Our security company, Securitas, conducts a patrol every night. In addition, our Safety committee has worked with the Beaumont Police Community Outreach Program to produce an effective Neighborhood Watch Program.

After researching the safety of our community of 1,853 homes, I am encouraged by what I learned; and I hope this information is reassuring for you as well. ~ **Karen Burton, karen@imaginomics.org**

Our Pet Recovery Team is made up of volunteers who are willing to assist all fellow pet owners here. These volunteers have been trained in trapping, bringing lost pets to safety, scanning, and reuniting pets with their owners. Our team is currently seeking new members to assist us in these very worthwhile efforts. Meanwhile, here are some tips if your pet goes missing. Do not chase or try to look for your pet. Stay home, secure any other pets, open your doors and your gate, and report the missing pet. We will do all we can to assist you. For both cats and dogs, find some dirty laundry, pillowcases, undergarments, gym clothes, socks, recently worn shoes and place them in a pile or a basket on your front porch. For cats, put out their



used litter box. If your pet has a favorite bed or blanket, add that to the pile. Tails & Trails will help network your lost pet while we search, and we will provide recommendations for bringing your pet home safely. Spreading your scent around, while looking for your pet, will only confuse their attempts to “scent” their way home. Very few stray dogs are likely to run up to you, especially if you don’t have food. Some may be very friendly and willing to jump into your vehicle. Never approach or chase a stray. This may drive them further from their home, stress them, and make recovery more difficult. Pets may become exhausted or hide. Try to keep dogs as close as possible to you. Speak in

soothing tones. Be still and encourage them to come to you. If you do have food with you, you can always drop a few pieces to keep the animal engaged. There may be times when we will not have adequate volunteers to assist. FOUR SEASONS VETERANS PARK

BIRDING CLUB

The Birding Club is changing. By the time you read this article, my wife and I will have moved to Nevada and the Club will be under new leadership. Before the move, in February and March, both birders and birds conspired to make my final days of birding at Four Seasons among the best since I started birding here. The birders did their part when, at the end of our very productive March 4 group bird walk (see below), the Club members made me feel very appreciated with gifts, cards, and good wishes that were topped off by a doughnuts-and-cookies going-away party!

The birds did their part to sweeten our bittersweet departure from Four Seasons by placing in front my binoculars not one, not two, but three Four Seasons first records! The streak started on Feb. 12 with a pair of Cassin's Finches at our feeder. Cassin's Finch, like so many of our wintering birds, is a mountain breeder that moves south and/or downslope in winter. On Feb. 28 I spotted a flock of eight Band-tailed Pigeons in the top of a tree at the east end of Trail B. Band-tailed Pigeon is another mountain breeder that moves south and/or downslope in winter. During the same stroll on Feb. 28, I spotted a single Evening Grosbeak at the west end of Trail B. This bird is rare in Southern California and was reported on the Inland Counties Rare Bird Alert. The bird was flocking with six Cassin's Finches (three male and three female). And yes, Evening Grosbeak is a mountain breeder that moves south and/or downslope in winter!

We finished the morning bird walk on March 4 with a total of 25 species. Highlights included a flock of Band-Tailed Pigeons (in the same location where they were first seen on Feb. 28), a female Phainopepla, and a flock of Cedar Waxwings. Later in the day, Tina Canon, Bill and Genie Cooper, Gerrie Karczynski, Barbara Wasco and I spotted 12 additional species, bringing the day's total to a whopping 37 species. Highlights included six Lawrence's Goldfinches, a Chipping Sparrow, and a male Cassin's Finch (perhaps one of same Cassin's Finches seen on Feb. 12 and 28). With the three new species found in February, the Club has now documented 126 species at Four Seasons and this list will continue to grow as the Club grows into the future. ~ **Steve Edelman**, steve.h.edelman@gmail.com

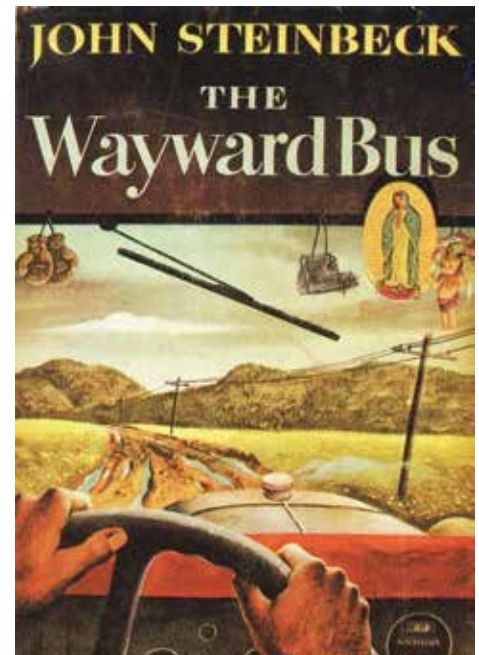

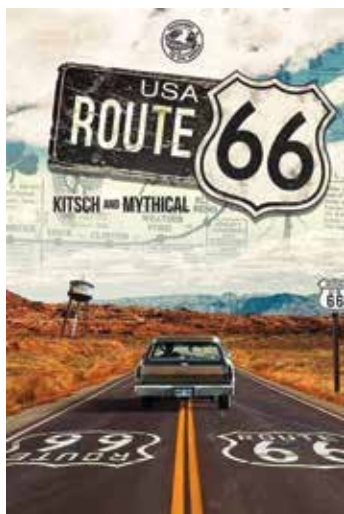

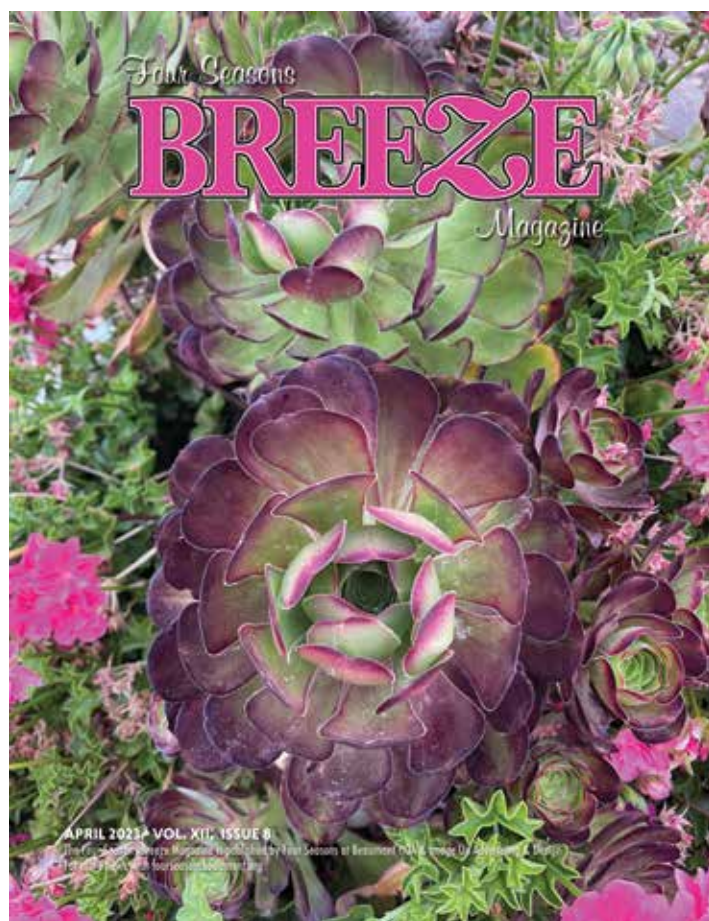
